At many historical societies like our own, having two paid staff members is a luxury. However, despite having two staff members, Cortland County Historical Society could not operate without our volunteers.

At the seminar on connecting with your fans, the volunteers (and even those paid staff members in attendance) all had one thing in common, passion about their organization. This passion serves as their driving force to volunteer. One woman commented that she had been goaded into volunteering, but her passion for the cause has spurred her continued involvement. The volunteers in the collections management class are much the same. Some of these volunteers are so dedicated they are opening new historical societies and museums. Others are tackling important parts of running a museum like collections and public relations.

Volunteers at Cortland County Historical Society are the same they have a passion for our mission. They see the importance of the work we do and give of their time and talents to make our programs successful. Without these volunteers the various programs Cortland County Historical Society offers would not be the success that they are now. During 2010 Cortland County Historical Society volunteers gave over 2,900 hours of their time. As the holidays descend upon us, it is time to remember that which we are thankful for, and I am grateful to the volunteers that make my job easier and much more pleasant by their enriching influence on my life.

Why I Volunteer at CCHS

This reminiscence from Elsie Gutchess sheds light on how she became such a staunch supporter of the Cortland County Historical Society.

“ Many years ago, in the middle 1930’s, my just retired (from being a Michigan school principal) great aunt, Elnora Blanchard took a taxi five days each week, the mile to and from the Cortland County Historical Society, to keep the Historical Society going in its little cramped and cold space in the Court House. She kept all the records and files, answered the mail, tended the collection, led their meetings and offered programs. The budget was zero. She and her retired (Cortland High School English teacher) maiden sister resided across Tompkins Street from us in the old family farmhouse and lived on nearly nothing. As we did, and all of our neighbors.

She lectured me (as only a school principal could!), I think I was in second grade, that when I grew up, I must support the Cortland County Historical Society, belong to the DAR, and take care of the family genealogy. I do, or have done, my best to meet her edicts.”

As the Historical Society honors our faithful and staunch volunteers, Elsie Gutchess’ name is one that comes to the top of the list! Elsie, we are indeed grateful for the many ways you support our Society!
